

# Books for your school and book lists curated by the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education (CLPE)





Resourceful and imaginative young Joe uses a single seed to turn his grey world into something wonderful.



Over the course of a week, Jasper the cat plants and tends to a bean, and learns that in fact it takes a "long, long, long time" for a beanstalk to grow.

Oliver is reluctant to eat the strange green vegetables on his plate, until Dad shows him the rainbow of vegetables that he grows in his garden.



Young inventor Jabari is frustrated that his flying machine is refusing to fly. Though he initially refuses help, working together with his little sister helps him solve the problem.



Two friends come across a flower seed and discover the cycle of life as they plant it, watch it grow, die, and leave a new crop of seeds behind. With playful, repetitive language.




**Nature Trail** by Benjamin Zephaniah and Nila Aye (Orchard)

An illustrated guide to indoor and outdoor gardening, filled with fun facts and plenty of activities to try.






**The Gigantic Turnip** by Aleksei Tolstoy and Niamh Sharkey (Barefoot Books)







A young girl who steals to survive in a harsh urban environment is transformed into a guerrila gardener, and in turn transforms her world into a lush green paradise, when she makes a promise to an old woman to plant all the seeds in her stolen bag.

**Du Iz Tak?** by Carson Ellis (Walker Books)

Written entirely in 'bug' language, this book charts the growth of a new plant over the course of a year, and how the garden's insect inhabitants respond to and engage with it.

Set in an imagined future of ecological crisis in which, following the extinction of the bees, children are employed as pollinators at an intensive and oppressive farming facility. It is in a secretly planted garden where true hope is seeded.

**Seed** by Caryl Lewis and George Ermos (Macmillan Children's Books)

In this magical adventure, Marty's grandfather gifts him a special seed which promises to transform his life. It transpires that the enormous pumpkin that grows from this seed takes its strength and sizes from the dreams of the community, and in turn brings wonder and hope to all.




Alyssa and the Spell Garden



This poetry picturebook is perfectly pitched for the young listener or early reader. These rhythmic, patterned poems ask to be read aloud and provide plenty of opportunities for joining in.

Subtitled 'Poems to share with little ones', this well-considered and beautifully produced collection speaks to the experiences of very young children, and is a joyous invitation to connect with the world around them.

**Caterpillar Cake** by Matt Goodfellow and Krina Patel-Sage (Otter-Barry Books)

Tuneful, witty and warm poems that are perfect for reading aloud and joining in with, reflecting everyday experiences, and opening up the imaginative possibilities of poetry, accompanied by exuberant and colourful illustrations.

**Big Green Crocodile** by Jane Newberry and Carolina Rabei (Otter-Barry Books)

A collection of sixteen contemporary action rhymes brought to life through bright and playful illustrations which are as active and joyfully noisy as the poems themselves. Each poem is accompanied by a 'Let's Play' section, inviting actions and interactions from the child reader.







Written by a spoken word poet, this is a rhythmic and relatable depiction of a child learning to ride a bike for the first time. There is pace and energy contained in the text formatting and the carefully chosen onomatopoeic language, plus a sense of movement enhanced by the intricate and sweeping watercolour illustrations

Much of the storytelling comes from the masterful illustrations, largely in greyscale with carefully deployed flashes of colour, and the symbol of the butterfly offering the first few quiet steps towards hope.
