I Am Festival Theme 2025: Make Some Noise

Celebrating a decade of amplifying young voices, the I Am Festival returns for 2025 with the theme of 'Make Some Noise', bringing creative expression to children and young people across London. Since 2015, award-winning London based charity A New Direction has provided a platform for thousands of children and young people to showcase their talents, leadership, ideas and opinions. A New Direction has consistently worked to remove barriers and provide an opportunity and space for children and young people to access cultural spaces. As this year marks a 10-year milestone, the I Am Festival will showcase the bold and positive impact across the

capital through partnerships with AFK, Young V&A and Tate Modern hosting schools across the capital taking place during Neurodiversity Celebration Week.

Steve Moffitt MBE, CEO of A New Direction, said:

"A New Direction has always championed the voices of children and young people. In March 2025, we celebrate 10 years of the I Am Festival, and it makes me immensely proud to recognise the impact we've achieved with the hundreds of children and young people we've worked with. None of this would have been possible without the supportive collaboration of our funders, partners, artists, teachers and pupils who have participated in, and championed our work over the years. We will continue to increase the engagement of Deaf, disabled and neurodivergent children and young people in the outstanding cultural spaces London has to offer.

Over the past five years, A New Direction has worked closely with AFK, a national charity supporting disabled children, young people and their families and in this partnership has collaborated on work with the Cultural Ambassadors. Over a sixmonth period, our Cultural Ambassadors meet weekly to develop their creative skills, work with different artists, and design their own activities for the festival.

We have facilitated and nurtured lasting relationships between schools and disabled artists and disability-led organisations, creating opportunities for collaboration and growth. From parades through Tate Modern to completing a top-secret mission around Kensington Palace, the I Am Festival has showcased the voices and talents of all involved. During 2018/19, Garratt Park School proudly delivered the first-ever non-verbal 10-minute talk at Tate Modern, marking a significant milestone in accessibility and creative expression.

"AFK is proud to collaborate again with A New Direction to host a work experience programme that opens opportunities for young disabled and neurodiverse talent. This inspiring partnership supports skills development, boosts confidence, and gives insight into the creative sector—an industry many of these young people aspire to join.
