Welcome

We are delighted to launch the second year of A New Direction's Primary Arts programme, offering free, high quality, inspiring arts, cultural and creative opportunities in and out of school for children and staff in London's state primary schools and primary SEND settings.

The entire Primary Arts programme is offered free of charge to schools, helping to unlock the creative potential, cultural capital and skills of school staff and children. The programme offers opportunities to support curriculum development, wellbeing, confidence, personal interest, and professional development in a time of increasing pressures on schools and their staff. It is designed with access and inclusion at its heart, and we hope that all primary settings will find something of interest to them and their pupils.

Booking for Primary Arts opens on Wednesday 10 September. The programme has five strands, four of which are included in this brochure, and the activity begins from November 2025. The fifth is the Cultural Education Leadership Programme, a year-long programme for teachers delivered in partnership with the Centre for Educational Leadership at UCL Institute of Education. This will reopen for applications in April 2026.

The In-Schools Touring Programme offers performances and workshops for pupils at school, with accompanying teacher CPD and classroom resources, including books and creative materials. Go & See gives free access to cultural experiences in venues across London for pupils in winter 2025 and summer 2026. Our Masterclasses on creative approaches to reader development for teachers are delivered in partnership with the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education, and our hands—on twilight Come & Try workshops with the Crafts Council explore a variety of craft disciplines and are suitable for all school staff. These activities reflect the breadth and quality of London's incredible cultural offering, and we would like to thank all the cultural organisations who are partnering with us on project delivery.

Primary Arts is generously supported by The City of London Corporation City Educational Trust Fund (29084), a City of London Corporation charity, and we are incredibly grateful for their continued support at a time of significant pressure on the education and cultural sectors in London.

Primary Arts was created in response to the release in March 2023 of the Coulbenkian report The Arts in Schools – Foundations for the Future, a reflective piece that articulates the various barriers that have discouraged and disallowed cultural education and arts in schools to thrive. We hope that this three–year programme will be one of many that start to address the findings of this report. We are very excited by this opportunity to create new cultural and creative opportunities for primary school children and staff across London, and we hope you can join us.

About the Programme

A New Direction's **Primary Arts** programme aims to increase access to high quality, inspiring arts, cultural and creative opportunities for children and staff in London's state primary schools and primary SEND settings.

Delivered in partnership with a range of cultural organisations, this menu of **free opportunities for schools** aims to unlock the creative potential, cultural capital and skills of school staff and children, offering opportunities to support curriculum development, wellbeing, confidence, personal interest and development. If your school is on its <u>Artsmark</u> journey, the programme may also help support your Artsmark aims.

In this brochure, you can find information about the following strands of the programme:

IN-SCHOOLS TOURING: a choice of ten arts performances and in-class workshops for your pupils, plus teacher CPD, a curated box of reading books and a selection of creative materials and resources.

GO & SEE: tickets for your pupils to experience theatre, film, museums, heritage and the visual arts.

MASTERCLASSES: CPD days exploring a range of creative approaches to literacy and reader development for teachers.

COME & TRY: a series of creative practical twilights for all school staff.

Bookings

Each section of the brochure includes information about how to book or express your interest. All bookings are managed through *our online booking platform*.

Each person booking to attend a Masterclass or Come & Try event must register themselves on the booking platform under their school profile. **Places cannot be booked on the behalf of others**. For the In-Schools Touring programme and Go & See, you will need to specify a lead teacher to liaise with us.

The entirety of the programme is offered free of charge, though charges may be made for late cancellations or no-shows.

Who can take part?

Primary Arts is open to **all state primary mainstream and special schools in London**. The programme is designed to include children in all primary year groups from Reception to Year 6.

Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme.

Schools and individuals can take part in more than one strand of the programme (but only one touring booking can be made per school per year).

Go & See is available to all eligible schools, but ticket numbers are limited.

Masterclasses are open to **qualified teachers** currently working at any level in eligible schools.

Come & Try twilights are open to any member of staff currently working in eligible schools, including teachers, Teaching Assistants, support staff, and admin staff.

An access budget is available to support engagement in this programme, for example for transport, BSL interpretation or other costs.

For the In-Schools Touring Programme and Go & See, if we receive more booking requests than we can accept onto the programme, schools will be selected based on a range of criteria including level of need, geography, previous engagement in Primary Arts and the capacity of the programme itself. The Masterclasses and Come & Try programmes are offered on a first come, first served basis and we will open waiting lists for fully-booked sessions.

Inclusion

This section provides inclusion information for SEND settings and for mainstream settings with large numbers of pupils with additional needs.

We aim for the full programme to be accessible to and supportive of Deaf, disabled and neurodiverse people, whether they are pupils or adults.

A New Direction believes in the talents and potential of all children and young people. We challenge the structural and systemic inequalities that influence children and young people's lives and opportunities and prioritise those that experience these. Our <u>I Am Network</u> for educators working with Deaf, disabled and neurodivergent children and young people in London's schools and specialist settings has been running for over 10 years, and our <u>I Am Festival</u> for Deaf, disabled and neurodiverse children and young people celebrated its 10th anniversary in 2025.

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Our experience of delivering these programmes informs the design and delivery of Primary Arts. Our partners include disability-led organisations and practitioners with lived experience. We also consult with SEND professionals, and we strive to ensure that the full programme is accessible to all.

Inclusion focus:

- We only work with organisations whose values and approaches around inclusion are aligned with our own.
- We work with a schools advisory group to ensure that we listen to what schools need. This group includes staff from SEND settings and SENDCos from mainstream primaries.
- We include access and inclusion information throughout this brochure to help schools find the offer that is right for them and their pupils.
- An access budget is available to support schools working with pupils with SEND to engage in the programme – for example, to support with the cost of minibus hire for trips or to bring additional support staff.
- All out-of-school activity for staff and pupils is delivered in accessible venues.
- The access budget can also be used to support staff participation in CPD

All five strands of Primary Arts are designed to work for mainstream and SEND settings.

For Pupils

The IN-SCHOOLS TOURING PROGRAMME brings a cultural organisation into your school to deliver a show and workshops for one year group of children. We also offer twilight staff CPD in school beforehand, and provide high quality materials, books and resources.

Programme adjustments

- For SEND settings with small class sizes, we may be able to offer the show and workshops to more than one year group.
- Shows and workshops can be adjusted to meet pupil needs (e.g. shorter, quieter, simpler, more sensory).
- Organisations bring an access and sensory toolkit with them, including fidget toys and ear defenders for pupils who might need them.
- Organisations are supported to co-plan with all schools before delivery takes place, so that they have a good understanding of your pupils and their needs



Inclusion

Our approach

- We discuss organisations' values and approaches around inclusion as part of our selection process each year to ensure they align with our own.
- Organisations working with us are supported by an Access & Inclusion Adviser to ensure their offer works for SEND settings.
- Everyone coming into schools attends an onboarding session that includes a focus on access and inclusion.
- Our Access & Inclusion Adviser will support in-school delivery if needed.

The GO & SEE programme offers schools free trips to a range of cultural venues. Schools can book for a year group but can also choose to work with a smaller group if they prefer. The programme is delivered in two seasons, winter (December) and summer (June/July).

Programme adjustments

- For SEND settings with small class sizes, we may be able to offer the trip to more than one year group.
- Many partner venues offer specific sessions or relaxed performances for SEND settings. These are clearly flagged in the programme brochure.
- Our access budget is available to SEND settings to support additional costs such as travel or additional support staff.

For staff

The three programme strands aimed at school staff are designed to support professionals working in any primary setting. All sessions are delivered in accessible venues, and we have an access budget available to support participants if needed.

The **Cultural Education Leadership Programme** focusses on teachers developing leadership skills in any type of setting. Each participant completes a Leadership for Change research project, choosing their own area of focus to support their own learning and development and that of their pupils.

Our MASTERCLASSES focus on creative approaches to reader development at all levels and in all settings.

Our COME & TRY sessions are mainly focused on staff wellbeing. They also provide a range of practical craft approaches that can be used in the classroom.

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



IN-SCHOOLS TOURING



In-Schools Touring

The Primary Arts In-Schools Touring programme brings high quality arts experiences into your school through performances and workshops for pupils, supported by teacher CPD and a range of additional resources.

Ten organisations are working with us to deliver the programme; their offers are outlined on the pages that follow. Activity in schools will take place in Spring 2 (February/March) 2026.

Participating schools receive:

- A performance (or experience) lasting around 1 hour, for all classes in one year group.
- An in-class workshop lasting 45 minutes to 1 hour, for each class in the same year group, that further explores the artform, themes and curriculum areas linked to the performance.
- A teacher twilight CPD session lasting 1 to 1.5 hours, held in your school during the four weeks prior to the performance. This will support preparation, whole–school engagement, and teacher and pupil learning.
- A range of resources to support communication and learning about the performance, including information for pupils, staff and families, and classroom activities.
- A **box of creative materials** worth around £250 to support creative classroom activities.
- Booklists linked to the programme, curated by the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education.
- A set of books worth around £150 to support reading for pleasure linked to the programme.

Access & Inclusion

Each offer is suitable for at least one Key Stage and can be adapted to work for pupils with additional needs whether in mainstream or SEND settings. Where needed, we will liaise with your school to ensure that the programme is inclusive for all your participating pupils.

Eligibility

Primary Arts is open to **all state primary mainstream and special schools in London**. The programme is designed to include children in all primary year groups from Reception to Year 6. Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme.

If your school or a member of your school staff is participating in another area of the Primary Arts programme, you are still eligible to make a booking request for this strand of the programme.

How to Make a Booking Request

Only one In-Schools Touring booking will be considered per school per year.

There are places available for 100 schools on the In-Schools Touring programme this year. We will prioritise schools that have not previously benefitted from this programme strand. If you participated in the In-Schools Touring programme in 2023/24 or 2024/25, you may not be allocated a place on the programme this year. However, you are still welcome to submit a booking request.

Please read the offer descriptions carefully on the pages that follow, consider your school's needs and interests, and identify your first and second choice of offer. Each description includes year group suitability and inclusion information. Please ensure the offer you are interested in is suitable for the year group you would like to take part.

When you are ready to make a booking request, please log in to the booking platform, select In-Schools Touring, and complete the booking request form. All booking requests must be submitted by 5pm on Friday 3 October 2025.

The form asks for practical information as well as date availability and should take around 10 to 15 minutes to complete. Once you have submitted the booking request form, we will contact you by **Wednesday 15 October 2025** to let you know whether we are able to offer your school a place on the programme. and move to your booking forward, where relevant.

Please note that while the In-Schools Touring programme is free of charge to schools, we may charge a fee of up to £1,000 for cancellations with less than three weeks' notice (excluding school holidays).

Arvon: Creative Writing Day

Fun and inspiring creative writing workshops led by professional writers, suitable for all abilities.



Arvon

Arvon is the UK's Home of Creative Writing, offering inspiring residential courses and workshops for schools. Since 1968, we've helped young people find their voice through writing. Authors like Emma Carroll and Lemn Sissay began their journeys with Arvon. Give your pupils the chance to discover their creative spark.

Arvon: Creative Writing Day

Key Stages:

Key Stage 2, SEND

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

English, particularly writing and speaking, wellbeing, developing a growth mindset, enrichment activities, raising attainment in speaking and listening.

About the show

Arvon is all about encouraging people to see themselves as writers. We believe writing creatively supports children to grow in confidence, improve writing skills and boost wellbeing.

Your school will be partnered with professional writers for the day, who will perform their own work and support pupils to develop and perform theirs. The show will inspire pupils by lifting their written words off the page and bringing the year group together to celebrate their writing. It will take place after pupil workshops, bringing all pupils together for a final celebration, with spoken word performances from the professional writers followed by pupils taking to the stage to share their written pieces authored in the classroom workshops.



45 minutes

Show SEND adaptations:

Shorter performance, adapted to any sensory needs (e.g. quieter).

About the pupil workshops:

Professional writers will lead creative writing workshops with the chosen classes. Workshops will offer the chance for your pupils to try their hand at prose writing and poetry, with the writers ensuring that there are multiple points of entry for pupils of all abilities.



Workshop SEND adaptations:

Co-planning with teachers to adapt approach. Adjustments to reduce writing (e.g. drawing, spoken word).

Teacher Twilight CPD:

Working with experienced creative writing facilitators, teachers will gain insight into teaching creative writing outside of the restrictions of the curriculum, coming away with useful tips and resources for encouraging creativity in their pupils.

Clowns Without Borders: Piranhas and Bananas

Clowns Without Borders: Piranhas and Bananas

Key Stages:

Reception, Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

PSHE, British values, creativity, wellbeing, healthy lifestyles, environment, developing a growth mindset, pupil voice.

About the show

Piranhas and Bananas is a joyful interactive show which was developed with Rohingya children in Bangladesh in 2019. It's filled with playful storytelling, physical comedy, silly walks, and even sillier noises. Flip Flop is working at Flannagan's Fish Sanctuary. She has great ideas for the vegetarian piranhas, but no one listens. Flip Flop enlists the help of her friends in the audience, proving that even unexpected heroes can make a big difference!

Show SEND adaptations:

Shortened and delivered with little to no spoken language. Scripts can be provided in advance to help children and educators.

About the pupil workshops:

Flip Flop is inspired by the imaginative ideas of children. They really helped her out of some tight spots! She believes the world would be better if children were listened to more.

This lively workshop immerses children in playful storytelling and physical comedy, encouraging them to recreate moments from Flip Flop's adventure. It explores who gets to make decisions, what it feels like to be listened to, and how we can listen to one another to help all voices be heard. We'll finish by showcasing the children's ideas on how their voices can be better included in school.

Workshop SEND adaptations:

Shortening the duration and limiting group sizes to just a few participants.

Teacher Twilight CPD:

Express Your Selfie: This practical CPD guides teachers through creative exercises to boost pupil voice in and out of the classroom. Based on our work with children and insights from our board (ages 6-11), it focuses on engaging children to creatively share their thoughts, challenges, ideas, solutions, and aspirations.

Working with games, stories and movement, teachers will gain a deeper understanding of how to create more meaningful and engaging pupil voice experiences for the children and themselves.

Discover Children's Story Centre: Story Suitcase

Bringing multi-sensory storytelling magic into your classroom to support your pupils' literacy and oracy.



Discover Children's Story Centre

Based in Newham, Discover is the UK's first Story Centre for children aged 0-11 and their families. Working with families, schools and community organisations, we support children's education, skill development and emotional wellbeing through stories and literature.



Discover Children's Story Centre: Story Suitcase

Key Stages:

Reception, Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Literacy, oracy, PSHE.

About the show

Unfold an interactive storytelling performance in the classroom from a magical Story Suitcase, full of props and sensory items. Guided by one of Discover's expert Story Builders, pupils will be invited to explore a story inspired by much-loved fairy tales. Using multi-sensory elements such as props, music and movement, the session is designed to spark imaginations, encourage participation, and develop an understanding of story structures and building blocks like syntax and vocabulary.

Show SEND adaptations:

Use of sensory resources, varied session lengths, removal of elements that could cause sensory discomfort such as music or noise making props.

About the pupil workshops:

In the workshop, pupils 'build' their own story, gaining inspiration for their creativity through props and other sensory prompts. The class will be supported to work collaboratively, sharing ideas and listening to others to support speaking and listening development. With an interactive, inclusive approach to literacy, the aim is to improve pupils' understanding of core literacy curriculum elements such as composition, vocabulary, and grammar while inspiring their passion for stories, reading and creative writing.

Workshop SEND adaptations:

Use of sensory items for tactile engagement. Inclusive approaches to literacy teaching that don't rely on reading comprehension and writing ability.

Teacher Twilight CPD:

Through interactive demonstrations and hands-on activities, teachers will explore how to use Discover's inclusive, dynamic approach to teaching literacy, using sensory props, story bags, and structured questioning to bring stories to life. We will guide teachers through a collaborative story-building exercise and support them to extend storytelling into cross-curricular learning, incorporating drama, movement, and discussion.

We will provide teachers with:

- A structured approach to creative storytelling that supports literacy development.
- A practical toolkit to engage pupils of all abilities, including those with SEND and EAL needs.
- Strategies to foster creativity, critical thinking, and communication skills in the classroom.

Emergency Exit Arts:The Curiosity Chest

A creative learning experience of curiosity, storytelling and discovery, building confident voices through oracy.



Emergency Exit Arts

Emergency Exit Arts (EEA) creates bold, transformative outdoor arts and school-based projects that spark curiosity, confidence and creativity. We bring accessible culture to communities and children, empowering them as participants and creators. Through shared artistic experiences, we challenge the ordinary and enrich lives with imagination, wonder and meaningful expression.

Emergency Exit Arts: The Curiosity Chest

Key Stages:

Key Stage 1, Key Stage 2, SEND

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

English, writing and speaking, wellbeing, developing a growth mindset, communication in speaking and listening, history and cultural understanding, PSHE, British values, democracy, creativity, pupil voice.

About the show

Unearthed beneath your school, a mysterious chest has reappeared – weathered but intact, and filled with strange artifacts: sharks' teeth, Krobo beads, time-traveling watches and bottled scents from lost worlds.

Believed to be the long-lost Curiosity Chest of 19th century explorer Frances Ann Potts, it arrives with a mission. Her father had urged her to explore the world, to know its people and to take pride in her ancestral roots. Now, your pupils can continue her legacy.

The Curiosity Chest is an immersive storytelling experience. Through live performance and discovery, pupils unlock imagination, become Collectors and celebrate the strange, the beautiful and the extraordinary.



Show SEND adaptations:

Shorter duration for smaller groups, sensory exploration and a calm, supportive atmosphere.

About the pupil workshops:

Following the performance, the adventure continues in the classroom. Led by the Collectors, the workshop invites students to become explorers, historians and storytellers, guiding a new generation in the art of noticing, collecting and wondering. Trained in interpreting oddities and sparking imagination, the Collectors support students in uncovering the chest's secrets through drama, discussion and creative writing. Children investigate artifacts, ask bold questions, and create their own responses, poems, news reports and imaginative tales. This workshop ignites curiosity, celebrates the unusual, and empowers pupils to see the world differently and contribute to Frances Ann's growing legacy as Collectors.



Workshop SEND adaptations:

Shorter session

Teacher Twilight CPD:

The CPD will allow teachers and support staff to explore artifacts, experience the activities their pupils will encounter, and gain practical techniques in drama, storytelling and creative writing. With a focus on inclusive, curiosity-driven learning, the session supports staff in embedding creative literacy across the curriculum for all learners.

Groundswell Arts: The Light Box: Sensory Exploration and Light Play

An interactive STEAM project that encourages children to explore light, reflection, colour, and shadow.



Groundswell Arts

Groundswell Arts facilitates creative arts experiences, giving time and space for children, families, artists, and practitioners to connect and see each other in new ways.

Groundswell Arts: The Light Box: Sensory Exploration and Light Play

Key Stages:

Reception, Key Stage 1, SEND

Relevant areas of the National Curriculum:

Art & design, light and dark, literacy and storytelling, shapes and patterns.

About the show

The Light Box is a purpose-built sensory installation and open-ended interactive environment that gives pupils the time and space to explore light, colour, shapes and shadows through a multi-sensory series of activities and play. Using the EYFS and Key Stage 1 curriculum, this activity enhances learning through creative play and curiosity.

The Light Box: Sensory Exploration and Light Play installation focuses on zones of activities that use a series of stories as prompts for the environments and work areas created.

Please note that for this show, the installation will need to be set up for the entire day so will require a space that can be used without interruptions.

Show SEND adaptations:

Duration of session can be shortened, number of participants in space reduced.

About the pupil workshops:

The class workshop will look at shadow puppetry and will combine both the science curriculum (Light, Shadows, Colours, Shapes and Patterns) with literacy and storytelling through puppets from existing stories or through a child's own imagination.

The workshop will look at different puppet designs. Pupils can explore how opaque and translucent objects affect the light being seen, as well as how distance and light sources can change the shapes and patterns being projected.

Workshop SEND adaptations:

Greater focus on play, use of a variety of sensory shadow puppets.

Teacher Twilight CPD:

The twilight session will complement the shadow puppetry work being done in the classroom and will look at different ways to create shadow puppets using a variety of materials. Puppets will include 2D and split pin shadow puppets, acetate and laminate puppets, and the use of wax paper, crayons and oil to create different effects that can be classroom to create characters and develop stories.

Art & design, creativity and learning, PSHE, wellbeing and healthy lifestyles, literacy, English.

About the show

Go & See

The Primary Arts Go & See programme gives pupils and staff the opportunity to experience the arts within venues across London rather than at school, through trips that include theatre, film, visual art, museums and heritage. The programme aims to support pupils' personal enjoyment, wellbeing and enrichment through the arts. It also aims to support teachers to connect these experiences to classroom learning through light-touch CPD and resources.

The programme has two seasons: Winter 2025 and Summer 2026.

For the WINTER season, schools can apply for tickets for a year group (or smaller group of pupils) to a choice of **five different theatre productions, and one immersive art installation**. These events all take place during December 2025.

For the **SUMMER** season, schools will be able to apply for tickets to **theatre**, **visual art**, **film**, **museum and heritage opportunities**. The Summer season will open for bookings in February 2026, with full details available in January 2026. These events will take place in June and July 2026.

Access & Inclusion

An access budget is available to support participant engagement in this programme, for example, we may be able to support with transport, additional staff or other costs. We will provide a Visual Story for each participating venue. Access information for venues is included in the offer descriptions below.

Eligibility

Primary Arts is open to all state primary mainstream and special schools in London.

Your school **must be in a London borough** to be eligible for the programme. If your school or a member of your school staff is participating in another area of the Primary Arts programme, you are still eligible to make a booking request for this strand of the programme.

Masterclasses



The Primary Arts Masterclasses programme offers a series of six full day CPD sessions delivered by creative literacy experts at the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education (CLPE). Each CPD session offers a stand-alone day of teacher development designed to support participants to explore and develop creative teaching approaches to a range of priorities around reader development.

The programme is designed so that each CPD session provides a comprehensive exploration of its topic and does not require participants to have attended any other sessions.

Participants at each session will:

- Hear from an expert advisory teacher from CLPE in partnership with a high-profile children's author/illustrator.
- · Work with peers to explore and develop creative approaches to literacy and reader development.
- · Receive at least two high-quality book to take away.
- Take away teaching plans and resources to use in the classroom.
- · Be invited to an exclusive twilight session following the Masterclass, giving you the opportunity to explore the library and connect with peers, with drinks and snacks provided.

Access & Inclusion

These Masterclasses will take an inclusive approach and are suitable for teachers working in primary mainstream and SEND settings.

The CLPE venue is accessible, with step free access, accessible toilets, and parking. An access budget is available to support participant engagement in this programme, for example for transport, BSL interpretation or other costs.

Eligibility

Primary Arts Masterclasses are aimed at **qualified teachers** currently working at any level in state primary mainstream and special schools in London. The programme is designed to support teachers working with pupils in all year groups from Reception to Year 6.

Your school must be in a London borough to be eligible for the programme.

If your school or a member of your school staff is participating in another area of the Primary Arts programme, you are still eligible to take part in this strand of the programme.

Schools can book up to three Masterclass sessions per year. Places are limited to two participants per school for any given session. If sessions are oversubscribed, priority will be given to schools that have not previously benefitted from the Masterclasses programme (i.e. in 2023/24 or 2024/25).

How to Book



- Getting to know your children as readers, their interests and fascinations, their development, skills and understanding as readers, and draw on this to support the development of effective provision and practice.
- A greater understanding of what progression and development in reading looks like and the connection between reading identity and reading attainment.





- How to nurture positive reader identity and broaden children's outlook through the use of quality inclusive literature.
- How to effectively choose and use a range of texts for different reading experiences, designed to promote reading for pleasure.
- Investigating and trialling key teaching approaches designed and proven to give all children access to quality texts and language and to raise engagement and attainment in reading across the school.
- The centrality of reading aloud as a key teaching approach that enables children to deepen response, improve access, develop vocabulary and draw attention to language models, while also modelling skilled reading behaviours and the pace, prosody and expression of fluent reading.
- Strategies for creating and maintaining a reading environment that
 is inviting and inclusive, that supports choosing and browsing, which
 invites re-reading and revisiting, and includes books that invite wider
 reading across forms, authors, poets and illustrators, topics or themes.

Takeaway:

Participants will receive a high-quality children's book for each primary phase (EYFS, KS1, KS2). They will also receive planning notes to help put strategies into practice in the classroom.



- Develop an understanding of how language can be used for effect, including language structures and choice of vocabulary.
- Consider how to find and choose stories to tell and use with children across the primary age phase.

- How to support children in creating, shaping, developing and publishing their own narratives using words and pictures following the authentic process of a practicing writer.
- How to embed creative practices across your school to develop children's engagement and attainment in reading and writing.



Come and join us at the Crafts Council Gallery for a fun and relaxed evening with transdisciplinary artist-facilitator-curator-organiser Kim Chin, who uses making as a tool for self-discovery, connection, and inspiring agency. They use absence and dissonance as a site for imagination and transformation, while integrating neurodivergent adaptations in cultural, education and community spaces.

The benefits of the workshops include a holistic approach to creativity, a friendly space to experiment and take risks, dedicated slow-down time to attune self-awareness, connect and build networks. You will learn different textile techniques, create a new memory manifested in their textile keep sake.
